Featured Speaker Polly Adams Sutton – sculptural basketry artist



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The San Juan Island Textile Guild is pleased to welcome back sculptural-basketry artist Polly Adams Sutton as our speaker. She will share stories and baskets from a trip to the island of Sardinia where she spent time in 2013 and share some of her wonderful basketry work. The talk should be informative and lively. We will be introduced to a new creative culture and have a chance to see many beautiful new baskets.

Several years ago, we were fortunate to have the Seattle-based artist present her talk about gathering and preparing the luscious native Washington cedar that she uses for her baskets. This talk about Sardinia

should be every bit as inspiring and wonderful.

Polly is a nationally recognized, award-winning artist who has exhibited in museums and galleries throughout the United States, and in numerous one-person and prestigious group shows, including the Renwick Gallery (Smithsonian) in Washington, D.C. and in traveling National Basket Organization exhibitions. Her work is also in the permanent collection of many museums, notably the Museum of Fine Arts Boston. In addition, one of her baskets was featured on the cover of the popular book 500 Baskets.

And on November 4-5 Polly will be teaching a new in-person basket workshop. A few spaces are still open for attending.

The San Juan County Fair Recap 2023

The San Juan County Fair is funny, in that it's simultaneously always the same, and never the same. I know it doesn't really make sense, but that is kind of how I think about it. Same Woolshed, but with a new look. In fact, a few of the other buildings had been remodeled or repurposed that gave the fairgrounds a new feel. Another fantastical Kevin Roth sculpture, but always something you could never imagine. New online entry system, but plenty of folks relying on the old-style hand-written tags. Lots of the same familiar faces, but always new ones. There is something comforting in all the Fair's familiarity, and always something new to look forward to.



For the Woolshed, we decided the same old space needed a makeover. We had the old bleachers removed and divided the space into alcoves. Mimi Anderson took all of our old Woolshed sheets and turned them into pleated curtains that we used to line the alcoves. It really gave the display a more professional look and gave visitors a more intimate and close up view of the entries. I guess the Fair Board liked it, too - we got an award for our Fiber Arts display! (Not to boast, but I would like to point out that our department has won awards four out of the past five years.)

For our display, we seemed to be back at our prepandemic levels. We had a total of 127 Entries (up from 75 last year) and a total of 64 exhibitors. And despite some ferry service being cancelled during the fair, we still had exhibitors from Shaw, Orcas, Lopez and San Juan Islands.

There were also notable awards from Guild members in other departments. Mimi Anderson won Best in Show in Textile Arts, for her dress, "Aleta's Secret", and Elizabeth McCubbin won both People's choice and Judge's Special Award in Creative Arts for her sculpture "A Wish III", that included 1,000 paper cranes and at least as many beads. Congratulations to all the award winners!

And, as usual, we had a full courtyard schedule with lots of events and demonstrations. This year's courtyard



theme was organized by Lee McEnery and focused around fiber processing. Many of our Guild's spinners were out there every day carding and spinning. On Saturday, Sara Pope from the Fleece Department brought some of her sheep to be sheared. We finished more spinning and carding, and Val White brought her loom and wove some of the yarn spun earlier in the week. We also had a variety of demonstrations during the week, including making cordage from plant materials, rug making using raw fleece on a peg loom (I had to look up what that was), and natural dying using walnuts and lichen.

One of my favorite stories from this year was about a man who visited the Courtyard (the one in the photo with Mary). He wanted to learn all about how the yarn was made - the teasing, the carding, the spinning, the weaving. I think he just happened upon the event, but was captivated. More than that, he returned the Woolshed later that evening as we were about to close up. This time he had brought with him family members and he was excitedly showing them the carders and spinning wheels that had been brought in from the courtyard, explaining in detail how they all worked. They also spent a long while enjoying Sue Stanley's Salish Woolly Dog exhibit. It was the perfect complement to the equipment, showing



the fiber to yarn to fabric. It was after 8 pm and we were closed, but there was no way I was going to rush them out. It was the perfect moment and all I could think was, "We made this happen."

And by "We", I mean all of you who made this happen. Sure, the superintendents are "in charge", but it's the hard work of Guild members, without which we could not bring it all together every year. So, a huge thank you is in order for all of our volunteers. Special thanks to Val Keaton and Elizabeth McCubbin as my Co-Superintendents. And to Elizabeth and Julie Packard for taking on the Sales Booth. And To Mimi Anderson for using her expert sewing skills to really spiff up the Woolshed. And to the exhibit team of Val, Mimi, Liz Pillow and Jeannie Naiman for making the most of our new layout. And to Barb Fagan for stepping in at the last minute to host our judge for the night. And to Laura Evans and Lois Moore who stayed well past their shifts to help with a marathon judging session. And to Lee McEnery, the mastermind behind this year's Courtyard events. And to Robin Atkins, Jeanie Fodor, and Jeannie Naiman, who made a second home in the Sales Booth and the Woolshed. And, the same as every year, we couldn't have made this happen without all of our volunteers.

And we'll be doing this all again next year. But it will probably be different.
