President's Message

As I write this, the wind is blowing 25-30 MPH at my house. It feels cold enough to be fall, yet, the light is different and flowers are peeking out. I think spring is close.

My birthday is in March. Our two daughters always arrange a lovely activity to spend time with them as my present. It is the best. This year, they took me to brunch at The Birch Door Café in Bellingham. It was delicious. Afterwards, we went to the Whatcom Museum specifically to view the "Katazome Today" exhibit.

Katazome is a Japanese method of dying fabrics. It uses a resist paste made of rice flour that is applied through a stencil onto the fabric. The fabric is then painted with dye. Once it is dried, the paste and excess dye is washed out. What remains is a magical result that is traditionally used for dying kimonos. Today this technique is evolving into new expressions as contemporary artists explore this process.

"Katazome Today" was co- curated by Seiko A. Purdue who is a Professor of Fiber/Fabrics at Western WA University along with Amy Chaloupka who is curator of Art at the Whatcom Museum. It includes work by 7 renowned artists. In addition, there are works created by students in the Fiber & Fabrics class taught by Seiko Purdue at Western WA University. It is called "Daidai: Generation After Generation". Daidai is the concept that expresses appreciation for handing down techniques from generation to generation'.

The work is mesmerizing, creative and steeped in tradition. I was fascinated by each piece. The tradition, attention to detail, nuances of color and the delicate images captivated me. It was a wonderful birthday gift that is still in my head and heart!!



For this coming All Island Meeting, Seiko Purdue has agreed to give a presentation of her experience with this exhibit, and the Katazome technique.

Katazome Today and Daidai: Generation after Generation are two exhibits that are worth visiting at least once. I will be returning to again be enthralled with each piece. I hope that you have an opportunity to take a trip to Bellingham for this adventure. It is glorious!

We've invited Professor Seiko Purdue, a Professor in the Dept. of Art and Art History at Western Washington University, to be our guest speaker for this meeting. She was instrumental in arranging and curating the current exhibit called "Katazome Today" at the Whatcom Museum in Bellingham. Dating back hundreds of years, katazome is a traditional Japanese method of dyeing textiles. A few of our members have already visited the exhibition, and given it rave reviews. Professor Purdue

will talk about the katazome dyeing technique and its history, and also about the current exhibition at the Whatcom Museum. In addition to her illustrated lecture, she will also be bringing some samples of cloth dyed using katazome techniques.

The agenda for this General Membership meeting will as always be constrained by the ferry schedule. The formal meeting will start at 11:45, and after opening remarks from our Guild President, Prof. Purdue will begin her lecture at 12 noon, and speak for about an hour. After a brief intermission for refreshments and visiting, we will hold the Business portion of the agenda. Hopefully, there may still be some time left for "Show and Tell".


Back in the Woolshed


