
How to Update Your Member Profile

Important Changes coming to the County Fair! County Fair - Thursday August 15 - Sunday August 18, 2024

The San Juan County Fair will be held from August 15 -18 at the San Juan County Fairgrounds on San Juan Island. This year's theme is "A Century of Growing", celebrating the 100th year at the Fairgrounds. Read on, as there are some very important changes this year.

Important - Note that the Fair will be held <u>Thursday though Sunday</u> and not the normal Wednesday-Saturday.

This year will also continue the online pre-entry of fair items. This system worked well (with a little patience!) and really cut down of our work collecting items on Entry Day. It also is a tremendous help to the Fair Staff in keeping track of entries and paying our premiums after the Fair. So, please, Use the online early entry system. We are planning on holding another early entry day at the Library again this summer.

Speaking of entry day, there will be big changes for that this year. In order to ease the burden on Fair Staff and volunteers, we are having early entry days.

- Early Entry Days would be Monday (8/12) & Tuesday (8/13) from 3 pm to 6 pm for nonperishable/still life entries (that includes all of the Woolshed entries).
- As an enticement, each early entry would earn the exhibitor a raffle ticket for a "Fair Swag Bag" that would include things like Fair passes, Food Court bucks, T-shirt, etc.
- We would still have an entry day as usual the day before Fair (Weds 8/14) from 9 am 6 pm.
- Note: For Fiber Arts only If you want an item to be judged, you'll need you have your entry in by Noon on Weds 8/14.

Also new for this year, Fair Staff will host entry pickup days on Lopez, Orcas, and Shaw Islands, likely on the Sunday before the Fair. They will bring the entries to a secure location at the Fairgrounds, to be distributed to their departments on Monday. Exhibitors from these islands are also free to bring items during one the set entry times listed above. We are assuming, too, that pickup days will be Monday, though there are some details still to be worked on that.

We'll also be setting up the online signups for Woolshed, Sales Booth, and Courtyard volunteer shifts soon, so keep an eye out for that. When available, there will be a link on new Guild website.
