
# Make your Own Woven Wool Rug

Curly Goat Studio (Heidi) is offering a peg loom rug class in February on San Juan Island and they would love to share the experience with you! Together you will be making a chunky woven wool rug from local fleece (about 2'x3' when finished). The size and coziness are perfect for a bedside, bathroom, or sitting room rug. All materials will be provided and you don't need to have any experience weaving or working with wool; everyone is welcome.

The looms are custom made by Heidi and are available to rent or purchase after class if you're interested in continuing with peg loom weaving. It's a super simple set up and they are small, portable, and can be used with many different materials including raw wool, fabric strips, yarn, or really anything that's long and flexible.

### Fiber Retreats with Deb Robson

In November, Deb Robson, co-author of the Fleece and Fiber Sourcebook, hosted two Fiber Retreats at Lakedale Resort on San Juan Island. She has been putting together these retreats since 2012, following the suggestion of Cat Bordhi. I was lucky to take part in the 2<sup>nd</sup> retreat this November. Usually, she hosts just one week in March and one week in November. Since the topic this fall was a particularly popular one, she decided to do two 4-day retreats. For 4 days, we went on a deep dive of the history of Shetland sheep in North America.

We learned that primarily, the first Shetland sheep arrived in Canada in 1980. Those initial sheep were locked to the specific farm in Ontario Canada for at least 5 years after their arrival and their offspring would also be bound to that farm for at least 5 years. A 2<sup>nd</sup> farm in Canada was discovered to also have Shetland sheep, having imported them back in 1948. Not all of those sheep were verifiable as 100%, but those that were able to trace their lineage back, were eligible for listing with the North American Shetland Sheep Association. All Shetland sheep in North America owe their heritage to these first 2 herds of sheep. Additional genetic diversity was introduced in the 2000's by way of artificial insemination using sperm from the UK.




In North America, there are 2 Shetland Sheep societies. First off, is the North America Shetland Sheep Association (NASSA), formed in 1993.

They are the first society and the largest. Secondly, there is the Fine Fleece Shetland Sheep Association (FFSSA) which was formed in 2010.

Lois Moore moved to San Juan Island with the last 11 of her flock of Shetlands (Stonehaven Farm, NASSA flock #629). She gave those Shetlands to Angie Shephard of Blacktail Bass & Beef (also

known as Stillwater Ranch), a farm off of Wold Rd. After having Suffolks, BFLs, Romneys, Shetlands, and Angora Goats, Angie decided to focus her energies on raising the Shetlands and Suffolks. She now has 19 Shetlands. She has a new ram, and he is being bred to 6 ewes, so we're hoping for a flock of new babies this spring. Many Shetland ewes have twins, triplets, or a few even have quadruplets. There will be San Juan Shetland fleece and yarn for sale in the future!

We learned that Shetland fleece can be superfine, as fine as Merino. Shetlands come in eleven different colors, and 30 different patterns and markings. The variety is truly wonderful. One participant had brought a sample of a Shetland fleece that she had purchased that had an average measurement of a tiny 14 microns. As soft as Grade A Cashmere. Most Shetland fleece is under 30 microns (which puts it in the next-to-skin softness category). You can purchase fleeces online from a variety of Shetland farms here in the US.



Deb provided us with a dozen or more samples of fleeces from a variety of Shetland sheep. From a Shetland sheep that is living in Shetland and is listed in the Shetland Flock Book (one of 2 UK registries), to Shetlands from around the US and Canada (including from a sheep on the original farm in Ontario, Canada). It was fun to play with the different fleeces and investigate their differences.

Oh, and did I mention how cute the Shetland sheep is? At the size of a large (or extra large) dog (ewes range from 75-100 pounds, and rams from 90-150) they are a very manageable size and the rams, in particular, can be very friendly. Sometimes they can be standoffish, but once they get to know and trust you, they enjoy being with you. We visited Angie and her farm and were delighted to have a couple of lambs and their mom eating out of our hands.


# **Guild Members at the Museum**
